From the Kirk Session – new Hardship fund, Communion services in the hall... and more.



The Kirk Session met on Tuesday 8th November, and had reports from the various teams that deal with the business of the congregation. From Finance, we heard that the proceeds

from the sale of Howgate church have now been received (and banked) – as with other sales of property, these funds can usually only be used for 'fabric' spending, for example on the upkeep or modification of our buildings.

We also decided, after some discussion, that we should set up a 'Hardship' fund, to be used by the minister at his discretion, to alleviate any particular needs drawn to his attention by people in our community. This is distinct from the 'Good Causes' fund, which has been using donations for tea/coffee after the service to support other charitable work (most recently, the Bethany Trust's 'Buy-a-bed' scheme). If you know of a charity which could benefit from the 'Good Causes' fund, please speak to a member of the Kirk Session. So that everybody knows what's happening, it was agreed that tea/coffee donations on the first Sunday each month will go to financing the tea, coffee and biscuits; that the donations on the second Sundays be put into the 'Hardship' fund, and that subsequent Sundays' donations each month go to the 'Good Causes' fund.

The Mission Team has been working on new ways of reaching out to our community – decisions still to be made. The **Fabric Team**

report covered the church ceiling and organ repairs (almost complete at time of writing), the purchase of a new laptop for use in church, the erection of the new sign over the hall door, and several smaller items. My thanks to all those who helped with the 'big dust' to make the church habitable for the Remembrance service on 13th November – great to be back in the church, and with so many folk there from the town as well as our own congregation.

A small group from the Session are looking at possible opportunities for developing the inside of the church building – we're still at the early stages, and working out how to negotiate 'listed building' status and other constraints.

Of more immediate interest, perhaps, was a decision that we would continue (from the New Year) to use the church hall for Communion services (on the last Sunday of each month) — there was general agreement that the feeling of fellowship while worshipping in the hall was particularly important for Communion services, as well as it being easier to serve Communion in the hall. As John said in church on 20th November, your comments on this decision are welcome

Now that we are back worshipping in church I'll put a copy of the **agreed minutes of Kirk Session meetings** in the church if you're interested in any of the details - probably at the back of the church, once all the organ pipes have been replaced! The minutes are usually 'agreed' at the next meeting, so they should be available about a month after each meeting – please let me know if you can't find them.

The last two months have been good ones for Messy Church - we have two or three new families coming along, one of which are from Peru....as mum speaks almost no English, this is a challenge for us, as we try to find the best ways of communicating the message we try to convey each month! We also have one or two additions to the team of helpers: they demonstrate that age is no barrier in this kind of activity!



We have been looking at well known Old Testament figures: Daniel (in October) and Jonah (in November). Both of these characters provided lots of material for crafts and activities: we have decorated biscuits to look like lions, and turned buns into big fishes with very large mouths (with a jelly baby Jonah being swallowed up or spat out according to choice!). We have tasted healthy fruits and vegetables blindfold....none of the

youngsters liked celery, and most of them Jonah worm trails nad no idea what it was, we've made

puppets with clothes pegs, created fiery furnaces out of plastic tubs (complete with the necessary figures inside), and raced up and down sorting out good and bad food choices along the way. Straws and paper plates helped us make fish spitting Jonah out, wool dipped in paint helped us make

wonderful worm trails, and then there was the search for Jonah inside the belly of the fish.....an assortment of small items including a wee lego man, sunk into 8 litres of horrid green jelly,

proved a great attraction as children (and some parents) tried plunging their hands into the bucket in an attempt to find Jonah, all the while imagining what it must have been like to spend several days inside the belly of the fish. Celebration times had us playing musical (?) instruments, creeping inside a "big fish" - yes, really! - and all the while listening as the team shared the important parts of the stories, encouraged everyone to join in the songs and actions, gathering it up in a prayer activity for adults and children alike.

Our Daniel meal was healthy vegetarian spaghetti Bolognese, followed by fresh fruit (and some cake!). Jonah week had us eating fish finger wraps and chips. Meal times are a great time for chat and questions - a good way of gathering up the ideas shared during the session, and also of getting to know each other better. 
