


Messy Church Update from Joan Cape

The day the ceiling came crashing down

After 250 years of service the ceiling above the organ decided enough was enough.

Early in August Agnes Ovenstone and Margaret Black walked into the sanctuary to be met with great lumps of plaster across the floor in the pulpit area,

and a great hole in the ceiling above. Something not quite right, looking a bit serious.

The ceiling above the organ is lath and plaster, made up of laths - thin strips of wood, around 25mm wide - covered in a lime-based plaster that has often been combined with coarse animal hair, such as goat or horse, for added stability and flexibility. Lath and plaster ceilings and walls were common in houses built from the 1700s all the way through the 1940s, lath and plaster was the interior wall construction method of choice. Our ceiling dates back to 1771.

The lifespan of lath and plaster can extend across several centuries, which our ceiling has. But when moisture from leaks saturates the wood laths, it increases the risk of chunks of plaster releasing and falling from the wall. Our property convener Gordon Macdonald spends a lot of time repairing leaking roofs, in the church and the hall. The portico at the front of the church is a favourite spot. taking the full force of any wind hurtling up the high

You may have noticed that the paint was flaking in the area, from an earlier leak which had been repaired and

dried out.

Redecoration was being arranged, but the area was now very fragile, and the rest is plain to see.

Unfortunately some of the plaster that fell was large and heavy, striking the organ below One of the front pipes you can see has a nasty bend at the top.



damage inside the organ has yet to be surveyed, the area presently deemed unsafe until stabilised and repaired.

A tarpaulin has been placed across the pipes to help catch any further falls

So what to do now?

Two scaffolding towers, one each side of the organ will be built and a walkway between them, above the organ created. The organ pipes below will be covered to protect them from further falls of plaster and rubble. The ceiling damage will be 'cut back' to find a stable joist / rafter on each side of the hole you see. Suitable plaster board will be fixed into place and a skim of plaster on top to finish the repair, ready for painting. At this point we should be able to return to the sanctuary for our Sunday

This accident is unfortunate as we had just restored part of the organ immediately below the fall of plaster, and Eileen had played it for one service on July 10th.

Once the area is safe Graham McDonald, Gordon Macdonald and myself will survey the internals of the organ, to assess the damage and create a plan to repair any damaged items, and remove rubble and dust from the pipes and mechanism. It will take some time to repair but we are confident that the organ will return to service as soon as possible.
