
Agnes Ovenstone

We were shocked and saddened to hear of the death of Agnes Ovenstone, prominent member of our church and leader of the Guild and active in many church and Guild activities.

Agnes grew up in Edinburgh leaving school at 15 to work with Caledonian Insurance Co in St. Andrews Square. Married in 1963 to lan Ovenstone, they moved with son David to Penicuik in 1967. where son Andrew was born in 1969.

Agnes joined St Mungo's, becoming a Sunday School teacher in 1973, later Superintendent; and remained in post right to the end. She had a kindly quality about her that children recognised and felt comfortable with.

She joined the Young Mothers Group and graduated to the Church Guild, in which she served long and faithfully, holding office as President. She joined the Kirk Session in February 1999 completing 25 years of service.



Agnes remained in good health for almost all of her life. It was only in these last few months her pain

increased unbearably and caused her to be admitted to the Royal Infirmary Edinburgh. She was expected to come back to us, but it was not to be.

Agnes will be a hard act to follow but if we work together this would be a lasting testament to remember her gifts that she freely gave to our church.



Compassion UK

Last November Janice Anderson gave a fascinating talk on Compassion UK during morning worship. She explained that Compassion is an international charity which works with local churches in 29 Third-World countries to lift children out of poverty, enabling them to access education and medical care that would otherwise be inaccessible



This is a real game-changer, and it works by people in countries like ours sponsoring individual children until they have completed their education and have found long-term employment. Some TC members were already involved in sponsoring children through Compassion, and now the Wednesday morning Bible Study group is sponsoring Agnegnigan, an 11-year-old boy from Togo.



All we know about him so far is that he is in year 7 at school (where his favourite subjects are maths and reading) and that he loves ball games, running, singing and football. We'll no doubt get to know him a lot better as we exchange letters over the years.

Easter Messy Church: March 24th Joan Cape

"A long story"

This Easter we decided to look at the whole of the Easter story, rather than just one part of it: from Palm Sunday up till the first Easter morning. The first activity on offer was a kind of treasure hunt: following clues, the youngsters (helped by parents) went from the hall to the garden several times, collecting various items along the way to put in a box and keep as a reminder of the events of Holy week (a leaf, a silver coin, a piece of purple cloth, a thorny twig ,a large nail). We decided the piece of bread and the chocolate egg should be eaten rather than kept!





Making palm trees using hand shapes (there's a pun in there – get it?) gave us a prop for the acting which came later, as well as allowing some discussion as to why this day is called "Palm Sunday". Card crosses, decorated with tissue squares. let us think about the cross and what it means - a reminder of Jesus' death, but also of the hope his death promises.

Planting seed in a pot was another opportunity to talk about new beginnings, and also the seeds of faith which Jesus "planted" during his life. A doughnut, a cracker, a Lindor chocolate, and lots of green icing – how better to create an Easter morning scene - and a chance to talk about how the women must have felt when they found the empty tomb.

Lots of questions too, about how all this came about: the children really do get the helpers thinking! Making Easter cards gave an opportunity to think about the people in our lives who need to know Jesus and his love for us - it's always a privilege to hear what's on the youngsters' minds, or to listen to parents as they share their concerns. Scraper foil crosses and some lovely colouring sheets provided an easy activity for the younger ones though a couple of mums really got into the colouring.

For our celebration the youngsters acted out parts of the story, as they listened to it being told: enthusiastic cheering as our (very small) Jesus walked through the crowd, silence as we passed round bread and fruit juice and thought about the last supper and the meaning of our communion service, changing emotions as we put Jesus in the tomb (well, under a table really!) and then, a wee while later found it empty. We finished off by writing our prayers prompted by what we'd seen and heard and pinning them to the old rough cross.


and also invite those attending the school SU groups.

In response to a request, we have offered our redundant hymn books to Iona Abbey, which needs to replace some very wellused books.




Towards the end of March we held a dinner and
