

Many thanks to all who supported me in prayer and encouragement during my recent trip to Rwanda and DRC, I'm so incredibly grateful to you, as all of the very specific prayer requests I had were positively answered.



Comfort International is the most incredible charity, supporting all the different projects in such practical, helpful ways, and it was an absolute privilege to be on this trip. All the initial fears I had about many things completely disappeared once I was there. Right up until the moment of reaching the border in DRC, I still

didn't know whether I would be admitted, due to my yellow fever exemption, so was definitely travelling in faith, but passed through without any problems, there being no-one in the Yellow Fever checkpoint and no-one stopped us going into the building where we then had to sign out of Rwanda and into DRC.

The whole trip was the most amazing experience ever, from beginning to end. The warmth and kindness of all the people we met was overwhelming.

Worked with an absolutely brilliant team of 14, the oldest being 78 and the youngest just 14. Many, many heartbreaking moments but also many moments of total joy, being able to help in so many projects. One of my absolute favourite days was helping make 150 mud bricks (6,000 required though!) in a pineapple field. The whole


community came together and we made a huge line, some of our team making the mud by trampling it with their feet, before big lumps of it were passed along, to end up in brick shaped moulds, to then dry out for a few days. After working on this for several hours, we all came together to share music, testimonies and information about the project. We were then treated to trays of the most fabulous pineapple I've ever had in my life! Was amazing as we were all so hot and hungry by that point!





On one of the days we travelled to a fairly remote village where we were helping with the building of a new house for one of the genocide widows who was looking after her two young grandchildren but whose current 'house' was just a dilapidated shack










We attended many different projects and heard lots of heartbreaking stories about what had happened to people during the genocide, so many people having lost all their family members. It's hard to even fathom how they can move on from that, but the sense of community and the way people care about each other is such a healing part of their journey. On one of the days when we went to a group of genocide survivors, there were many more people than we had anticipated. We had bought 80 donuts and 40 rolls and about





100 bananas, so people could have either a donut or roll. We wondered how on earth we were going to feed all these people and and started to give the food out, praying it would somehow stretch! It did and we even had 4 rolls left over! Gave those to the closest group of 4 boys I could see as, having 4 grandsons, I know boys are always hungry!

Moving into DRC was a very different experience, as the abject poverty became much worse and much more visible.





We visited the hospital which had been looted & ransacked earlier this year, as the team had been asked to open a new maternity part, and heard how very difficult it was for the staff to keep going, due to the constant sense of danger, and the complete lack of resources.





Visiting the schools, it was so hard to see the desperate state they were in, without even a concrete floor, as those were too expensive, so just massive rocks on the ground, barely any roofs and broken benches and tables.

Teachers have to check for snakes before every lesson as if any child gets bitten, they have to get taken to hospital, which then costs the school money. The completely dedicated teachers receive no salary as there is no money to pay them. Comfort International have wonderful sponsorship schemes, so some of the teachers are sponsored, which makes a massive difference to them.





The very hardest day was the one where we went to an orphanage where, as well as the 27 orphans resident, around 400 other



starving children were there, who only receive food twice a week. It was abject chaos as we tried to feed all of them with a simple meal of rice, beans & potatoes, there really wasn't any organised way to do it, so that was the most heartbreaking day, especially when the food ran out and we still had many children to feed. We were able to share the team's lunch as much as we could among them, although it definitely wasn't enough to fill them up.

I will never forget the most powerful worship I've ever experienced in my life at every single project we were in, most especially with the Children of Liberty (ex child soldiers) who had formed a choir.

Their singing was so beautiful and incredibly moving. Given what these young people have had to endure and been made to do, it was just amazing to hear them worship God in the



way they did. Similarly, with the Street Kids Rescue Project where 46 children had been rescued from the rubbish dump and whose lives have been completely turned around by the Project.

Very last day in Congo & we're now back in Rwanda before heading to the airport late tonight for the first leg of the journey.



I had so many fears about this trip, all of which disappeared once being here & cried so much as we left the Congolese church this morning as the whole experience, particularly in Congo, has just been incredible. Beauty in such brokenness, astonishing. Arrived for church at 9 and left at 12.30 to drive back to Rwanda, though service would still be ongoing for ages after that!

There's so much more to say about this two week experience, but not enough space or time here to share it. Hopefully, there will be an opportunity to share more at some point but for now, if anyone would like to know more about the many different ways of being involved, check out the Comfort International website.'
