#### Guild - Sepsis FEAT: 6 November - Jenny Ramsay

The speaker on Monday 6 November was Gill Thomson from the charity Sepsis Research FEAT - originally the Fiona Elizabeth Agnew Trust named after a lady and her unborn child who died from sepsis after which her husband set up the charity in 2013.

Gill explained that Sepsis is the body's life threatening overreaction to any infection and can affect anyone at any time with 50,000 people being killed by sepsis every year in the UK. Symptoms include very high or low temperature, shivering,

confusion, passing less urine than usual and blotchy/cold arms or legs.

The charity aims to fund research and raise awareness, to save lives and improve outcomes for patients as sepsis can lead to life changing

consequences. They work with researchers to understand the processes that lead to sepsis and

identify drugs and treatment for patients in the future.

The University of Edinburgh GenOMICC project based locally at the Bush has already increased the understanding of the genetics and treatment of critical illness. Awareness is raised through social media, mainstream media and the press.

#### **Guild Project: Chocolate Heaven - 20 November** Report Jenny Ramage

Our speaker today was Ruth Box from the **Guild Project Chocolate Heaven which** has the motto Changing Lives with Chocolate. They aim to take God's message to unreached people groups.

Ruth started off with a guiz to see what we knew about chocolate, 3 members got 4 out of 4 questions right and were rewarded with

a chocolate. It was explained that people groups are based on language and culture rather than country.

Pioneers has 3000 missionaries working in 100 countries around the world. The Chocolate Heaven project is based on a large island in South East Asia and is run by Paul' and 'Sarah' who work with local people who grow chocolate beans which are then processed in the small factory set up by 'Paul and 'Sarah' to make chocolate and employs local people.

In this way they get to know the people and can begin to spread God's Word. Ruth went on to explain the processes involved in the production of chocolate. There were some short videos to show us the factory and the people working there. We were asked to pray for 'Paul' and 'Sarah' and the work that they are doing. Ruth finished by singing People Need The Lord, an unexpected treat as she had such a lovely voice.

There was also the opportunity to buy some of the chocolate bars in different flavours which we all took advantage of!

The church was filled with the various organisations in and around Penicuik, with a welcome return of the Army and Air cadets. The Deputy Lord Lieutenant Rachel Oliphant represented His Maiesty King Charles III. Penicuik Silver Band provided the musical accompaniment for our praise hymns.

The Rev John Urquhart led our service, with the parade commander, Staff Sergeant Arran Johnstone Leading in the colours of the Royal British Legion, army and Girl Guides which were received by the minister.





As we approached 11am Staff Sergeant Arran Johnstone the Act of Remembrance and bugler Anna Florence of the Silver Band took to the gallery to play the last post, followed by the lone piper playing the lament, which faded into the distance as we commenced our 2 minute silence at 11am. Reveille signalled the end of our silence. Session Clerk Neil Cape read our first reading from Micah with Deputy Lord Lieutenant Rachel Oliphant





We watched 'Letters home' a poignant video set in 1916 with two brothers, one in the trenches at Ancre on the western front in France, the other a naval sailor on the high seas, writing to their young sister at home. As she played the piano the postman calls with news from the front.

War destroys lives, hopes and dreams, and we next see photos of the two brothers on the sideboard, together with their medals and letters tied in string. The same pianist and tune is

being played on the piano, but the hands are old and gnarled as the caption 'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old' closes the scene. Lest we forget.

We closed the service with the National Anthem. The organisations led by the pipe band marched to the war memorial to lay wreaths, myself once again laying one on behalf of Trinity Community church. A short service was led by Pastor David Shedden of Penicuik Baptist church.

# Compassion Compassion Sunday

#### Compassion Sunday - 19 November

We welcomed Janice Anderson from Compassion UK to tell us about the work she champions and is directly involved with. Compassion UK is a Christian child development charity, working in partnership with local churches to release children from poverty in

Janice told us that Compassion is an international children's charity, working in 29 countries partnering with 8,500 local churches within

communities experiencing poverty. Worldwide, 356 million children live in poverty, without access to education, health, housing, nutrition, sanitation or water.

Janice explained that poverty is like a thief, robbing a child's self confidence, tells you are worth-

less, don't matter, that you are nothing. It lets you believe you have no hope and no future. But this is a lie, and they need to know they are loved and cared for by our loving God, and he has a plan for every child.

Compassion work is Christ centred, church based and child focused. As a sponsor of a child you receive personal letters and photos from your sponsored child, project updates, stories and prayer updates. An App on your phone gives access to all these via the myCompassion portal.

Janice became a sponsor of a young Colombian boy and told us of a visit she made to Colombia to meet her sponsored child and family. She saw first hand the misery endured in poor accommodation they called home. But she also saw the projects helping children develop skills for their future



Janice finished her talk with a video 'One last letter', where sponsored children, now in adulthood, reflect on what it meant to them to be part of the compassion project.
