


Youth Alpha follow-up group Ann Dunsire

Epiphany at Trinity Community Church - 7 January

The celebration of Christmas closes on January 6, otherwise known as the Epiphany of the Lord. We all know about Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, sheep. donkey, innkeeper, stable, hay.

Fiona Devoy focused on the darker side of the nativity using the

Star Wars Empire Strikes Back film as a parallel to

explain our nativity story.



In the film the Empire was an oppressive society ruling by military power and fear, similar to the Roman empire at

the time of Jesus. Both were hated, being a struggle between good and evil. Darth Vader and King Herod were similar characters, both 'striking back' against good. Into this



God sends Jesus. who seems weak and helpless to fight back against evil.

So the nativity

manger scenes with shepherds, wise men, angels and baby Jesus are totally inaccurate. It is though romantic to think of these three men setting out on their quest with gifts of gold, Frankincense and Myrrh, heading to a place, some 1000 miles away, that they don't quite know where.



Did they find what they were looking for, and how did it affect their lives? The church talks about the wise men reaching Bethlehem on January 5th Epiphany Eve, or as we know it 12th night, when our decorations are taken down. But eastern countries celebrate the nativity on the 6th January.

It was neither an easy or

quick journey. They were never going to arrive in time for the birth, the bible telling us it was two years later when Jesus was a toddler when they finally arrived.

They did ask for directions in Jerusalem, from a man called Herod. Though he told them, a little village called Bethlehem, a bit like say Howgate, Elsrickle, or Peebles to us. Herod's intentions however were not entirely pure either. King Herod was furious at being outwitted by the wise men, ordering the murder of a whole generation of children to ensure the death of one new baby king. Both Darth Vader and Herod wanted to keep the power status quo in their favour.

Even today oppressive rulers force people to flee to safety as refugees Fiona noted recent events in Ukraine, Israel, Gaza and across the world, and the role of the church, remembering that these people are human beings seeking sanctuary from evil and oppression



From the Kirk Session

At the start of every year we have to send a report on membership to the Presbytery, which then gets used to provide data for the Church of Scotland.



You may be interested to know that at the end of 2023 we had 187 members on the Communion Roll, in addition to 6 adherents. Adherents are entitled to vote in, for example, the election of a new minister, but have not formally joined the church - this could be for several reasons...perhaps because they are a member of a different denomination but choose to worship as part of our congregation.

There was one wedding, one service of blessing of a child, and 18 funerals were conducted by the minister and members of the congregation (Margaret Webster, David Hogg, Joan Cape).

In 2023 we gained one new member, but lost two who moved elsewhere, and one who has moved away without leaving a contact address. In addition 10 members died during the year, and we remember them, thanking God for their contribution and witness in this community, and remembering their families and friends in our prayers.

Messy Church - 28 January Report by Joan Cape

Sunday, January 28th, found us once again in the church hall for our monthly Messy Church Session. Our theme was "Searching for Jesus", based on the story of the wise men as told in Matthew 2, 1-12.

It's the bit of the Christmas story which is often overlooked. either being rolled into the Nativity story (where it doesn't quite fit) or lost as we move on to something else in the New Year, skipping over Epiphany on the way. We don't know much about these three slightly mysterious characters other than what we read here. But we do know some important things: they came from a foreign land far away, they had to trust in the star to guide



them, and they didn't really know where they were going or what they would find there. But they did know they'd find someone important, so they brought special gifts. We assume this little fellowSHIP travelled on camels, the SHIPS of the desert, and that they experienced a number of hardSHIPs along the way. When they found the baby Jesus they recognized he was to be wor**SHIP**ped.

Using lollipop sticks and scraps the youngsters made a wise man (or even three). Bookmarks or puppets: reminders of the story. We talked about what it feels like to be lonely, and how the fellowship we find in Messy Church, and through knowing Jesus can help. Using some very sticky brown paint we made hand print pictures of camels, and thought about some of the hardships the travellers must have experienced on their journey: perhaps it was as difficult for them to keep clean as it was for us to get our hands clean of paint!! Full marks to lna for being willing to supervise this activity!



Our rocking rolling camels, made from card, bottle tops and cocktail sticks demonstrated how uncomfortable it must have felt, riding along on a camel - another hardship. We talked about what helps us feel safe when things are a bit wobbly. The camel is often called the "ship of the desert". It can go for a long time without drinking, and it can deal with hot and cold temperatures, putting up with hardships that we don't find easy to deal with.



As we made some little edible ships using salad veg and humus or cheese. we thanked God for the wonderful ways in which he provides for our needs, and thought of all the "ships" that crop up in this story! Plastic pots were painted and decorated - gifts fit for a king - to be used to save pennies for those experiencing hardship. And an interesting cut and fold star gave everyone some verses to guide them, just as the star guided the wise men.

In our celebration time we thought a bit more about the journey of the three wise men and Joan shared the story of "the other wise man"*, who fails in his guest to find Jesus. as he stops to help a variety of people in need along the way, selling his treasures (gifts for the king) to do so. Reaching Jerusalem just as Jesus dies on the cross, he is struck on the head by a falling roof tile as the earthquake occurs. Lying there dying he hears a voice: "Verily I say unto thee. Inasmuch as thou hast done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, thou hast done it unto me." (Matthew 25:40) He dies at peace, filled with wonder and iov. knowing that his treasures were accepted, and that he had found his King. We're all making a journey to find Jesus, we're all different and we'll all do it different ways - but if, like the wise men, we persevere, we will find him.

And then we had tea together: baked potato, beans, cheese and of course haggis (remember the date!), with jelly and healthy fresh fruit salad to finish.

Do pray for our families, that they would come to know you, and give thanks for the faithful team who make these sessions work.
