
Holiday Club - Team meeting 26 February

Welcoming the New Year at Trinity Community Church

Our first service of the new year was led by Rev Fred Harrison, covering for John Urquhart who was away with family in Barcelona Spain for some R & R, to recover from all the Advent and Christmas services. Gordon MacDonald welcomed Fred to lead our service, remembering a previous time with us, back in 2010.

Being a wintry morning Fred recalled his drive over to Penicuik where the traffic seemed to travel at around 10mph, even though the snow was all on the footpaths! Begging the question 'When will we get there?'



Fred opened with the Presbytery prayer, highlighting the good works going on in our church.



Returning to the theme of travelling, Fred looked at the three wise men story, asking did anyone know their names, where they came from, or what the gifts were. In **Time with the Children** he took samples of the gifts to show the children. First Gold a thin piece of gold flake, then Frankincense smelling like flowers, and finally Myrrh smelling spicy and slightly smoky. With help from one of the children the Gold, followed by Frankincense and Myrrh were passed around the congregation.

Only by looking in the Bible can we tell there were three gifts that came from the east, but not how many people brought them. Myth tells us that they came as far away as 1500 miles, east of modern day Tehran in Iran.

The children were then set a maths challenge. Camels walk 25 miles a day, how long to travel 1500 miles? They agreed it would take 60 days for the journey. On their way they visited King Herod before reaching Bethlehem, and then 1500 miles to return home, another 60 days. Fred had taken a big story down to a few lines. A long way to see the Messiah, baby Jesus. We are fortunate that Jesus is always with us at all times,

including during this service in our church.



Fred's sermon stated that the Orthodox Church thinks there were 12 wise men, but our Bible does not state how many. Matthew tells us what we do know, that they were Magi, sorcerers, people who read the stars, astrologers. To travel such a journey there would be servants, tents, food, water etc. However if they were kings they would have

brought courtiers and armies to keep them safe. So there would be hundreds if not thousands travelling to Bethlehem. Nothing is mentioned of this in history or our bible.


Guild January and February Meetings

presented by project manager Rod Lugg. Unfortunately Rod is unable to make that date, but hopefully we will feature the talk later in the year.





Pentland Piano Festival - 18 January



Penicuik North Kirk hosted this years festival on Saturday 18th. Featuring pianists of all ages, each having the opportunity to play in front of an audience, some for the first time.



Organiser and sponsor Graham McDonald, who has maintained, repaired and played the organ in our church on a number of occasions, was on hand to provide support and encouragement to the players. Though not competitive it was good to see so many young people from pre-school to secondary and beyond taking part. A Bosendorfer 210 concert grand piano took pride of place at the front of the church sanctuary, offering another treat for all the players.

The Saturday evening featured a concert open to the public with many of the players from during the day playing, plus musicians playing guitar, flute and other instruments joining the pianists. Pentland School of Music Jazz Band played a selection of music from their repertoire, with several soloists taking to the floor.



During the concert Graham announced a new initiative that the Pentland School of music is progressing. The current music school at Clerk Road has outgrown the facilities available, as the school now includes guitar, drums, strings and wind instrument classes in addition to piano playing. To cater for this expansion, and support other creative arts in Penicuik looking for a place to operate, Graham is in the process of setting up a trust to purchase Valleyfield House, which sits behind the Town Hall.

We look forward to further piano festivals, displaying the wealth of musical talent within Penicuik and the surrounding area.

Although we had no meeting this month, I can provide some informal updates on progress (or otherwise) on various projects:


Breakfast Club - start date delayed because there has been a delay in submitting PVG applications
