


heard we've also to help with building a new house for a widow with 4 children as her current one is too old to be repaired.

Wanted: Community researcher for mapping provision for children and families in **Penicuik**

The aim is to find out, through personal interaction, what is being done for our target group (children and families) and what gaps there are in provision (and when they occur) with results presented in a report.





We want to recruit a person to help develop a record of what we know already, (including schools, social work, and similar agencies, but also, informal groups, local food pantries, advice and information services, uniformed organisations, toddlers' groups and churches).

An honorarium of £1,000 will be available for the person to undertake this short-term research.



Annual Congregational Meeting - 15 June Session Clerk: Neil Cape

The Annual Congregational Meeting (held this year on Sunday 15th June) looks backward to the previous calendar year, and forward to the second half of the current year and beyond. It gives space to ask - what did we do well, or not so well? How were our hopes realised? Is this year going as well as we thought?

It's good to take time to look back 6 months to the end of 2024,

remembering where we have been as a congregation, and how what we did then has affected our life as a congregation now. The most obvious change is the completion of the project to remove the central pews, and replace them with a level floor, with carpet and chairs. It turned out to be a lot more complicated than we thought, as I'm sure vou're well aware, and our thanks go especially to Gordon MacDonald for master-minding all the twists and turns of the building work.



On top of that was the legal requirement to make safe the Bell Tower in the graveyard, which we had thought was part of the

graveyard, and owned by Midlothian Council. Fortunately, the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland permitted us to spend the money required to fix the walls and roof (still to be completed); at least we had funds from the sale of Howgate and Penicuik South buildings – funds which can only be spent on building repairs, although that may change in future.



Although on paper our congregation appears to have very generous 'reserves', these cannot be generally used for the day-to-day running costs of the congregation. In the first half of 2025 our income (from members' giving, hall rentals, fund-raising and interest on investments) pretty well matched our regular expenditure (contributions to the Church of Scotland to pay ministers' salaries and related costs, gas and electricity for the church and halls, routine maintenance of all our buildings, the Council Tax on the

However, the projected expenditure for the second half of this year significantly exceeds our projected income, as explained by the Treasurer, so we all need to review our giving to the church if we are to 'pay our way', let alone embark on new projects like the proposed Breakfast Club at the High School.

Apart from buildings and finances, and the proposed Breakfast Club, we can rejoice in the ongoing young people's group (Tuesday Youth Bible Group), and the provision of activities

It was a sad day on Thursday 26 June as Renew 26 hosts & guests gathered at the Glencorse centre for the last time.



The Bible does speak about money -- quite frequently -- more than many ministers speak about it! The New Testament

Let me reassure you that I don't know (and I don't want to know) how much you are giving individually or as families. (Only those who need to know do.) I know incomes can vary considerably within one congregation of Christians, so we are not expecting you to all give the same, and I know that times are tight for some, but I'm
