#### Church of Scotland Learning by John Urguhart



Church of Scotland Learning is a relatively new initiative which is worth exploring personally or together with Christian friends. It is located on the world wide web, though if that puts you off, you can always do it with other people, who will deal with the technical bits for you.

But don't let this put you off: registering is a relatively simple process if you have an email address. Once this is done, you can find out about a range of learning opportunities to help you in your spiritual development and to gain practical skills. These opportunities are available to all who are engaged in the life of the Church of Scotland, whether in a leadership role or not. You don't need to be an expert -- and no one is going to assess you or report on your progress!

The courses are divided under these headings: mission: discipleship; leadership and relationship; worship, sacraments and preaching; character, ethics and development; faith, vocation and spirituality. The wide aim is to equip people to embrace and embody the teachings of Jesus within their community and in the wider world.

One of the easier courses is called Talking About Your Faith. It aims to help people become more confident in sharing Jesus with others. Through the course, you can learn to listen to others carefully and with curiosity, as well as learn to listen to God. You might get to know better the Gospel story and develop your own faith story, ready to share it with others. The course is designed for small groups: in other words, for a house group or for a Bible study group or a friendship group or those who are interested in doing the course. No previous experience is required to lead it.

# Tribute to Eileen Marchant - Friday 14 June

We said our final farewell to Eileen Marchant on Friday 14 June at St. James the Less church. Known to many of us as our regular church organist, occasionally switching to the piano when the organ refused to play properly, Eileen also led the choir back in the day.

Eileen grew up in rural Nottinghamshire - playing in the fields, getting a lift home on the hay cart, playing in an old bus with her friend

Son Andrew related the story of Eileen falling from her bike on a bank holiday during WW2. There was

nobody to offer help or assessment, these were before the NHS and the local GP's were not available. What to do? Someone suggested asking at the local Prisoner of War camp. A German doctor from the camp was willing to come out and assess Eileen, offering advice for her parents to help them look after her for the next few days. They were grateful for his help; it didn't matter that he was German - even during those difficult days.

Eileen took up Pharmacy doing it with meticulous care and thought for the good of the patients. However, she would really have loved to become a professional pianist. Music was her real passion she met husband Eric through playing percussion in the Nottingham Symphony Orchestra and when they moved to Penicuik in 1962 they they would play music late into the evening. Piano lessons for local children and the rehearsals of local music groups were the soundtrack to son Andrew's homework.

Eileen also enjoyed playing Percussion, regularly with the Penicuik Silver Band, and occasionally with orchestras. She once joined Andrew and wife Livia with the Really Terrible Orchestra, (A regular feature at the Edinburgh Fringe), to play in New York Town Hall where she brought a touch of professional discipline to the tubular bells and had a great time!

Eileen started a Maths degree. She'd always enjoyed maths at school, and decided as an adult that she would like to learn more.

Eileen became St Mungo's Church new organist. Already a capable pianist, the organ pedals were a novelty. Eileen wasn't very tall and the first difficulty was reaching the pedals. Nearly 40 years of playing the church organ and developing the church choir gave both Eileen and Eric many good times. Church music also led to membership of the Edinburgh Society of Organists and the Borders Guild of Organists. She was an enthusiastic member of both, and edited the ESO magazine "Console" for a number of

Eileen was a mother, a musician, a pharmacist, a mathematician, enjoying her personal passions of plants and birds to her last days. Please remember sons Andrew, Adrian and their families in your prayers.

# Annual Congregational Meeting - 16 June

ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Congregational Meeting was held after the Sunday Service on 16 June. The meeting is an opportunity for the Kirk Session to present the status of the running of your church over the past years and the progress of activities declared at the previous annual meeting in 2023. The meeting includes the financial

situation, buildings and property, plus planned and existing groups currently on hold. activities. Our minister John Urquhart opened the meeting in prayer, followed by approval of the 2023 meeting minutes.

Toastie Tuesday Joyce MacLean updated us on a new outreach



initiative 'Toastie Tuesday' aimed at secondary school children at the High School, offering lunch each Tuesday. Volunteers were identified but the school reported that our offer of lunch time support was not the problem time.

They would however appreciate support for a morning breakfast. So Toastie

Tuesday has morphed into 'Morning Breakfast' each and every school morning! Planned to run from 0745 to 0830 a 'lite breakfast', e.g. breakfast cereal bars, toast etc, not a cooked bacon and eggs style meal will be provided. This offer is in response to some children arriving at school not having eaten breakfast that morning, indeed some not having had an evening



meal the day before! Without having eaten these children are tired and find learning extremely difficult. Joyce asked for volunteers to join a rota for this initiative to contact her at any time.

Seeds for Growth. Joyce explained this Church of Scotland fund



the above 'morning breakfast' but also other 'holiday club' SEEDS events for children. This fund will help finance these GROWTH activities to get them started. We will apply for the initial £1000 grant until we can gauge how many children will be involved. Next year, if these

initiatives are a success we can increase our bid for funding to e.g. £10000 up to £40000 each year. Experience of other churches identified up to 200 children using the morning breakfast type offering.

Praise Band. John talked of the efforts to setup a band to accompany Sunday morning praise. This has been difficult but we are still looking for people to sing live to a prerecorded backing track or video and lead the congregation singing. We have successfully tried this a number of



times, volunteers being requested. Speak to John if you are interested.

Toddler Group. Neil Cape reported on behalf of Joan, of a means of reaching voung families. Joan spoke to the other churches in Penicuik to create a pool of volunteers. A lack of response means the toddler group whilst still a possibility is

Youth Worker. John reported that work establishing reaching families and children should be a basis before calling in a youth worker to help where work has already started.

Church Buildings. Gordon Macdonald reported that identifying a skilled workforce for our ageing buildings is an ongoing issue. The church roof has been stabilised this past year. Removing the pews in the central aisle required levelling the floor, under which were found leaking central heating pipes. After 100-150 years of operation they have as you could say' reached their 'sell by date' and were found to leak, quite badly in some





Similar wear and tear on the rainwater downpipes outside. The church hall is also having damp proofing carried out, and St. Kentigern Bell tower is being stabilised and restored. Finally the refurbished Hearse House is planned to open end August, as a

visitor centre on the Penicuik Heritage Regeneration project.

Pastoral Care. Neil again stood in for Joan, explaining how we which will help finance not only plan to go forward with congregation pastoral support, moving on from Elder visits.



Safeguarding awareness and a more flexible approach, using a dedicated 'pastoral team' to support the church family. A full report will be published in TC News next month.

Church Directory. Neil announced an updated of who does what and contact details now available.

## Annual Report & Financial Accounts.

Neil outlined the report, now available to view or download on our website, covering the first full year of Trinity Community Church. Joyce Maclean explained the financial accounts status, e.g. offerings,

After questions from the congregation John closed the meeting with The Grace.



# Messy Church: June 23rd: "Together we can do it" (Luke Chapter 5, verses 17 - 26) Report by Joan Cape



Of course, the sign that we all know shows who is our best friend and how much he cares for us is the cross: we hope our beautifully decorated ceramic crosses will remind us that our friend Jesus is always with us.

First of all we discovered by trial and error that it's quite possible to stand in a circle holding hands and pass a hula hoop round without breaking the circle yet with the hoop passing over everyone's body. #### From the Kirk Session Report by Neil Cape Session Clerk

At its meeting in June, the Kirk Session received reports from the Teams set up to manage and plan the congregation's activities, and agreed the agenda for the Annual Congregational Meeting, which was held on 16th June after morning service (see Jim Paterson's report in



The main financial news was a change in the Church of Scotland rules as to how money from the sale of buildings can be used - this is something that is very important for us, as the proceeds from the sale of Penicuik South church, halls and manse, and the sale of Howgate church, are held for us by the Church of Scotland. Up until recently, such funds could only be used for other building work (repair or maintenance of existing buildings, new buildings or upgrades to buildings); however, this year's General Assembly has agreed that both the interest on such funds, and even some of the capital sums held by the Church of Scotland can (if agreed that the expenditure is for missionrelated projects) be used for 'mission' work.

In addition, the 'Seeds for Growth' Fund, specifically aimed at projects which support the growth of



the church, has been expanded; we have applied for a 'level 1' award (the lowest level, and upgradeable later) to support a proposed 'Breakfast Club' at Penicuik High School; details of this await the outcome of a meeting by the minister and others with staff at the High School.

You'll all be waiting, like me, for news of when we can get back into the church. The new heating pipes (to replace the

underfloor pipes which were discovered to be in a poor and unsafe state) are on order, and we hope they will be installed soon. Then we can proceed to finish the new floor ready for carpeting and chairs. However, I still can't give you a firm date for this.

On the mission front, in addition to the Breakfast Club proposal, a small team of people is being

organised to provide activities for children during morning service: even if we don't have many children attending church services, we need to be ready to welcome them if and when they do come. Please pray for both the Breakfast Club, and the 'Kidspace' project; if you've not already thought about volunteering for these, there's still scope for more people to help -

contact Joyce MacLean about the Breakfast Club, and Joan Cape or Ruth Aird about 'Kidspace'.
