

ACORN and Trinity Services

ACORN - 19 May

We invited Paul Haringman, ACORN National Director (Scotland), who has preached to us in the past, to join us on 19 May service to once again speak to us, this time using the theme 'My faith is not about me'. First we heard first from member Susan Wong who told us what ACORN is, (Ask, Call, Obey, Report, Notice) and how it works for her, first in a video conversation with Rev Peter Wood, followed by the Rev John Urguhart live in the church hall.

- A Ask, Pray 'God who beyond my church are you nudging me to engage with today'
- C Call. Be open to God's call when the answer comes.
- O Obey, Ask 'How are you'?
- R Report, Tell another Christian what happened.
- N Notice, Be aware of what God has done in you and through you



Paul built on Susan's experience using scripture and examples to explain how ACORN works and reported that In the Church of Scotland 80% will never talk about their faith, their whole life. Some 53% of non-Christians know a practicing Christian, and 33% want to know more about Jesus, i.e. one in three. Finally 85 out of 100 non-Christians like the Christian they know.



Most of four activities focused on either wind or fire or both – as we made old fashioned spinners with card and string, a different sort of spinner which let us make flames above a disciple's head (using two little pictures)stuck to a drinking straw), and flying doves - carrying the Holy Spirit far and wide across

Wonderful fiery streamers (amazing what can be

done with cut down plastic cups and strips of florist's ribbon) and wind socks which streamed long trails of "fire" behind them as they whizzed over our heads. And then there were the tongues of flames dangling from on high – made from paper plates cut in spirals and coloured in. We had windmills too, and paper whistles - a feast of sound and colour.

And perhaps the high point, when we all called out together our praises to God – each in a different foreign language, ably coached by Janis and David . The excitement of the youngsters (and their adults!) gave a flavour of what the atmosphere must have been like on that first Pentecost.



We acted out the story, we sang together, and we launched our prayers on paper planes, carried by the air - each taking home a plane made by someone else, to pray the prayer they found written there. Hot dogs and salad were appreciated by all - and then we had more to celebrate as we shared a birthday cake with one of our helpers to make her birthday a little more special...and it was of course decorated with flames for the occasion: made of strawberry slices! We had little food left over. as you can imagine!

After several days of torrential rain, it was a relief to find the rain stopped on the morning of May 25th.

A couple of tables were set up amid the many gazebos and other stalls, and a busy afternoon was enjoyed by a small team from the churches - handing out fliers and talking about who we are and what we do, as well as what we have to offer to anyone who is interested. Incredible testimonies of so many young people coming to faith recently, which are so inspirational, and it's no coincidence that the UNITE event to bring young people together across Lothian is now taking place. If you would please pray for this event, that would be brilliant.

Jesus tells us to be alert to the signs of the times. Young people are finding faith. So many young people give their lives to Christ. Over Easter amazing things happened worldwide:-

- many churches reported bumper attendances.
- 12000 were baptised in France one of the most secular nations on earth
- 419 were baptised by our friends at New Life Church in Colorado Springs.
- 469 gave their lives to Christ at Audacious church in Manchester
- 116 got saved at Soul Church in Norwich
- Influencers with millions of followers are professing faith some even getting baptised.
- Columns in the Wall Street Journal and the London Times are reporting a return to religion. amongst the young. The Spectator even using the (over-excited) headline 'Revival'. More than 7000 school classrooms have now been turned into prayer rooms thanks to Prayer Spaces in Schools
- 25% of Australians are saying they'd accept an invitation to church and 70% that they talk to the God they're no longer supposed to believe in!

Now if you're reading this and thinking 'it doesn't feel like that where I live, all we can say is this:

Firstly, let's pray! It doesn't matter how small the spark, if you pour petrol on it you can start a fire. Pray on your own. Pray with others.



Secondly, let's be confident in sharing our faith. There are clear signs of a growing spiritual hunger in the land - people are more open than they were to the Lord. These things always begin in certain hotspots before they

Thirdly, let's invest in young people. The turning is most marked amongst Gen Z. (People born between 1997 to 2012). Let's not miss this moment of opportunity.

Finally, if this stirs your heart, please pray, think, dream for the next great awakening in our lands.

On this note, please pray for the joint youth event at Dalkeith on 9th June, that the Holy Spirit would work powerfully that evening amongst the young people.
