



How the crayons quitting story might help us

Sunday 22 September was led by Joan Cape While our minister John was away at an event in Oxford. Joan chose the theme of 'Who's missing? And how can we encourage them back?, trying to identify what we could do and how. Joan used the parable of the prodigal son. presenting it in a different and interactive way, to explore the problem.

Using the story 'The Day the Crayons Quit' featuring the main character Duncan we heard the tales of each of the crayons in his colouring box, how they felt misused



overlooked, abused and neglected. Some were desperate for change but resigned to continue, whilst others decided to leave and seek solace or adventure elsewhere.


Each of the crayon characters was presented

by members of our congregation, relating to Duncan their tales, concerns and wishes to change the future. As Duncan seemed to

be at the heart of all the crayons problems Joan put forward that maybe it was us as the congregation who were part of the problem we face.

We worked in small groups to see how we could resolve some of these problems and people that may welcome our reaching out to them. Joan then pulled the stories

together in the reflection time using the story of the prodigal son,



how he was disillusioned, left, got lost and confused before returning to his father. The feeling of the father's other son is also the resentment and feeling of being overlooked in favour of the disobedient brother.

Jesus's teaching using this parable gives us hints as to how to address these conflicts in order to resolve what could be irreconcilable differences. Conflict is a human failing and is not easy to resolve, as seen by the many wars and conflicts between peoples across our world.

Revenge, vengeance and

punishment quickly appear as the reaction of choice, but rarely return the expected result. Rather they often serve to simply escalate the issue.

Perhaps the prodigal son parable, though a difficult pill to swallow, is worthy of exploring to restore peace and love across

our precious world. Our exercise with the crayons may have helped take one step along that long road.

Growing Young Past, current and future work involving younger people

Part 1 - Past and current work

Please read and pray about these things. A lot of these initiatives only started because someone was praying and was 'nudged' by God to do something about it and shared it with the wider church.



What have we tried with younger people and what did we learn?

- Toasty Tuesday (TT) was an idea which we took to Penicuik High School (PHS), saying that we would be interested in any ideas that they had. TT wasn't feasible because of a change to lunchtimes. However, PHS proposed involvement in a Breakfast Club instead, which we took to Penicuik Churches Together PCT to develop. (See below.)
- · Youth Alpha was a PCT initiative, involving a team from City on a Hill, Trinity Community and the North Kirk, with support from St James the Less. This indicated a need for regular support of younger people, which led to TYBG (below).
- Gather on the Green was a PCT initiative to get to know people in the new housing. It was successful to begin with, attracting significant numbers of children. However, we encountered increasingly wet weather and some concern from local people. We paused it to try to resolve the concern through the estate's factors, but that did not happen

What are other longstanding activities in Penicuik?

- The Summer Holiday Club is a PCT initiative led by Scripture Union Scotland, who are willing to lead it for another year. We must start praying and looking for alternative support and leadership.
- Messy Church, although it meets in our hall, also involves volunteers from local churches. They are exploring reaching other children and families through leafleting the primary schools.

What are we currently doing and what are we learning as we go?

- TYBG (Tuesday Youth Bible Club) came out of Youth Alpha and is a Penicuik-wide project. It's led by a team: Andrew and Ann Dunsire, joined this term by Susan Wong. They are using SU 'Rooted' materials this term and are supported in prayer by a WhatsApp group and also by an ecumenical prayer time, which we hope will be a regular occurrence. We are exploring the possibility of a new meeting place for TYBG, if they outgrow the Dunsires' living room.
- Kidscape is a newly developed activity for P1-7s on Sunday mornings in our church. A small start was boosted by holiday club. A room has been set aside upstairs in the church, but needs further development, with the possible painting of a mural.
- The team for all-age talks now includes three members. Please pray about new members for the team.
- The Breakfast Club is in development with PHS. It involves the PCT churches in a new kind of relationship with PHS. It is currently in the phase of getting together all the necessary PVGs. Please pray for perseverance at this time and for future funding.
- SU Groups in the High Schools: there is an existing team of two for PHS: Andrew Dunsire and Caroline Toms. A team for Beeslack High School is in development. Praise God!
- ACORN and TryPraying are ways of encouraging outward-looking believers, with a more prayerful and missional mind-set. The ACORN Director for Scotland, Paul Haringman, recently said: 'Effective Christian leadership and momentum is not so much measured by the effectiveness of a strategic plan, but by people learning to obey God's nudge in single moments.'
- Making church a more comfortable environment for newcomers. In common with other things, it takes longer than you think! We hope to have the church building in operation by the end of this month, We maybe need to consider next a new entrance to the main building.

Next Month - Part 2 What might our next 'experiments' be?

- Further develop relationship with primary schools.
- A multi-purpose room to be developed with comfortable chairs,
- A Families and Toddlers Group.
- An evening activity for younger people in one of our church halls.
- A Children and Families worker (or whatever we finally call the post.)
- Focused prayer on specific areas.
- Seeking church partners.
- Better communication of projects with younger people.
- Changing church culture towards being a more welcoming place for new people.

Messy Church - 29 September: Spreading God's love

Sunday 29th September, a slightly apprehensive group of leaders: only five of our team able to be

present, and we were doing things slightly differently..... sometimes it's hard for the families to connect the activities with our story, when that story doesn't come till the very end of

the session. So we've decided to do the activities together. with our story and talking in parts, instead of all at the end. We'll try this for the next couple of months and see how it

We started by making pictures of our faces (on paper plates), talking about how we are all different, yet God loves us all the same. And we made sure we knew each other's names, just as God does. You can see our Messy Church family on the notice board in the hall





Neil then led everyone, from the youngest child to the oldest adult, in a game of Follow my leader. We imagined following Jesus to the top of a big hill where we sat down to listen to part of Matthew's gospel: Jesus telling the people how we are called to share God's love, with some clues as to how to do that.

Spreading God's love was the message of our next activity: spreading jam onto biscuits, sandwiching two together then spreading icing on top, decorating the whole thing with some sweets.....lots of sticky stuff, just as real love is "sticky".

How much does God love us? He loves us to bits. Sticky letters, sparkly red hearts, and some bits of jigsaw puzzle got us all working together to make pictures to take home while talking about how it feels to be loved.

And so back to our story: Jesus told the people that they needed to let their light shine out, he also told them that they should be like salt....it's no use keeping it in the salt cellar, and it's no use simply putting a pile of it at the side of the plate - to



be effective it needs to be mixed in with whatever it's meant to

flavour. Tasting some popcorn was a fun way of finding out that a sprinkle of salt does make a difference! For our prayer time we all took two little wooden people – one to keep, to remind us of someone we know who needs God's love, and one to give to that person to tell them that God loves them...and we care about them too. Suddenly it was time for dinner: baked potatoes and filings were well received, and then pudding spreading butter and golden syrup onto Christine's lovely pancakes was a good reminder of the message of spreading

We had ten children with us. from six different families. Our new family decided to stay for the whole time and maybe come back, our South American mum (who hadn't come for a long time) left making arrangements to go for coffee with our Portuguese speaking family. Surely God's love is beginning to spread!

Trading Standards speaks to Guild: 16 September Report by Jenny Ramage

The guest speaker at the 16 September meeting was John Watt Principal Trading Standards Officer with Midlothian Council. John began by telling us about what they do - advise local consumers and businesses, enforce legislation and report to the Procurator Fiscal.

He then spoke about doorstep crimes that had taken place. The team also deal with product safety, age restricted sales, counterfeiting, weights and measures, farm animal health and welfare and second-hand car dealers. He went on to give examples of mass marketing scams which were wide ranging and gave details of where to report these.



Doorstep selling and rogue traders and consumers rights followed, even showing us photos of actual rogue traders who have operated in Penicuik. Finally John informed us about the National Scams Team and the Trusted Trader Scheme and left us some of his cards so that we can contact him with any relevant information.

Sheila Haig: 1935 - 2024

We said our final farewell to Sheila on Thursday 19 September.

Sheila was born in Buckhaven in Fife on the 5th August 1935 Her parents were Bill and Jenny Stewart; who went on to have 3 more girls and one boy. Sheila took the role of eldest child very seriously - I'm sure that many of us recognised that seriousness and sense of responsibility in Sheila throughout



When Sheila left school, she started work as a clerk in the Pensions

Department of Standard Life in George Street Edinburgh. This proved to be the beginning of a long, successful and happy career. Sheila worked there, with a gap of only 9 years, when Alan and Pauline were young, until she retired at the age of 60 in 1995.

Sheila first met her future husband Henry, who had gone along to a dance with the St Mungo's Youth Group. It was a slow-burning romance. They knew each other, at a distance, for a few years before starting to go out together to the pictures as well as the dancing.

They were engaged in 1960, and married the following year in the Church of Christ in Edinburgh, [where Sheila had been baptised]. Alan was born the year after, while they were still in their first home in Roslin. And the family was complete with Pauline's arrival 3 years later by which time they had moved to Woodside Drive in Penicuik, and when Pauline was two their final move was to their home in Broomhill Road

Many of Sheila's practical and creative skills were used in her church life – as a member of St Mungo's, [as it was then]. She played the piano for the junior Sunday School for a while, joined the Young Mothers Group and graduated to the Church Guild, where she served as president for many years.

Sheila always paid great attention to detail, had a sharp mind and was sometimes sharply spoken. But that was just Sheila! She was very forthright, you always knew where you stood with Sheila. Sheila was a lovely lady, colleagues thought very highly of her. Once you got past her stern exterior, she was warm & compassionate and very funny. Her love for her family was obvious.

Our prayers are with Sheila's family as we remember fondly our times over the years with her.
