

Hearse House: Transformation to Exhibition Centre

The Hearse House which you pass at the side of the church, on your way to the hall for coffee after a Sunday service, has been transformed, from a dilapidated building ready to collapse, into a bright repurposed exhibition centre. On Saturday 24 August 2024 it was formally opened at a launch led by Rod Lugg, Penicuik Heritage Regeneration project manager. The completion of the hearse house is the latest part in an ongoing programme of town centre improvements.

Built in 1800 to house the 1761 horse drawn hearse the listed building had fallen into disrepair over the past 70 odd years, to the point it was on Historic Environment Scotland's 'Building at Risk Register', and about to collapse completely.

Some 70 people attended the presentation in the town hall, with representatives of the funders, local partnerships and the general public. They were welcomed by Councillor Debbi McCall, chair of the Penicuik Regeneration Project and Provost of Midlothian.

Clerk Mausoleum

Rod Lugg gave a brief presentation summarising the aims and objectives of the project, some achievements and the background to the restoration of the Hearse House and the development of the Heritage Trail. After Rod's talk and slide show we all









walked up to the hearse house, or should I say exhibition centre, to see the fitted out inside, including a model of the Clerk Mausoleum, a scheduled ancient monument.





Sanctuary Pew Removal Upgrade restarts Report by Jim Paterson & Gordon MacDonald

After a long wait for the special central heating pipes to arrive, installation has now restarted.



As previously reported the project to replace the central aisle of pews with individual chairs and tables, required the floor to be changed from a gentle slope to completely flat, to ensure visitors in wheelchairs will not roll down a slope. Lifting the old floor uncovered a series of leaks in the central heating pipe work. Estimated at 100 to 150 years old the pipes it could be argued had seen their best years.

The replacement pipes, most in stainless steel, old cast iron pipes no longer being available or desirable, were ordered, manufactured and arrived in 6 metre lengths, along with a variety of specialised connectors and fittings. First issue was how to get a 6 metre pipe into the church. A side window was removed to allow the



pipes into the church onto a cradle from where they were cut to length and installed.

During this work yet more leaks were discovered both in the church and the feed to the boiler house. With all the pipes installed the water can be turned on and the boiler fired up. We will then see if the system is leak proof before refitting the new floor.

To make the most of the heat from the pipes under the floor we will be fitting material under them that will reflect the heat upward, and grills in the new flooring to allow this heat to rise into the church. Should be a win win providing

more heat inside the church for less effort and therefore less gas. Our property convenor Gordon MacDonald has a keen eye to make our church as efficient as possible as well as being kind to the planet.

This extensive work has created guite a lot of dirt and dust, so a deep clean will be required before we lay the new carpets and install the furniture.

The plan is to be back in the church sanctuary before Remembrance Sunday in November, so a case of all hands on deck
